# TD Summer Reading Club 2023

National program statistics



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#### STARTING POINT

This report details an evaluation of the 2023 TD Summer Reading Club program delivered by, and through, libraries across the country.

#### Introduction to this year's report

The TD Summer Reading Club (TDSRC) is a national bilingual program that engages Canadian children in the joy of reading while championing Canadian writers and illustrators. Children who register at their local library receive free program materials and can also track their reading and access fun reading activities through the kids' site. Participating libraries are provided with thematic booklists, access to illustrations, programming and activity ideas and free outreach materials for promoting the program in their community.

As Canadians are becoming more acclimated to life with COVID-19, Canada has returned to a new normal state. With libraries open to the public operating at normal hours, an increased number of children continue returning to the TDSRC with in-person programs running for the second year in a row post COVID-19.

The main objective of this study has been to provide information about the reach and success of the program to the TDSRC Partners, Toronto Public Library, TD Bank Group and Library and Archives Canada as well as to participating libraries. The specific research objectives have continued to be focused around two key things:

- Measure the number of programs, activities and attendance attributed to, organized by, or otherwise associated with, the TD Summer Reading Club; and
- Provide recommendations for how the TDSRC program may be improved.

As we did last year, the data presented here are based on two sources of information:

- Responses to the Maru/Blue evaluation form which collected feedback on the program from the grass-roots point of view including the number of children who registered inperson at their libraries or using a 3<sup>rd</sup> party website as arranged by their library; and
- The TDSRC Kids' website (<a href="https://www.tdsummerreadingclub.ca">https://www.clubdelecturetd.ca</a>) which provided us with the number of children who registered for the program directly on the site.

#### Library inclusion in this evaluation

In total, 1,862 libraries are represented in this report by way of either Maru/Blue's evaluation form or the TDSRC database of online registrations. In total, 89% of Canadian libraries are represented here - 75% by way of Maru/Blue's form and an additional 14% by way of the TDSRC's registration database.

### Methodology

Despite the fact that libraries are organized differently in each province and territory and can be managed as 'systems' or as individual entities, we report numbers based on individual libraries. Librarians responsible for the program at each library were invited to submit information about their 2023 program online by way of an email containing a unique link that took them directly to the evaluation form where they entered their information.

Please note that the registration numbers presented in this report represent a combination of those provided by the libraries themselves by way of that form, as well as those provided by the TDSRC team by way of their online registration system.

Using the most recent contact information available for all participating libraries provided by the TDSRC team, Maru/Blue sent out  $^{\sim}1,000$  email invitations in both official languages. The invitations were sent on the  $1^{st}$  of September 2023 and the form was available to complete until the  $1^{st}$  of November 2023. Although the initial end date was  $30^{th}$  of September, an extension was granted to accommodate libraries willing to participate but required additional time to complete the survey.

We received 558 responses to the survey, representing a total of 1,575 individual libraries – a response rate of 75%. Added to these data are the registrations completed on the TDSRC website which accounts for an additional 287 libraries.

In 2020 and 2021, no weighting was applied as we believed that an extrapolation to population-wide totals within each region would inappropriately over-inflate registration in years when many libraries were either closed to the public and/or severely restricted in the services they could provide for at least some of the time the program was running.

We reinstated the weighting scheme as Canada returned to close-to-normal registration levels in 2022. Therefore, the weighted results in 2023 are in their correct proportion within the total of all Canadian libraries who participated in the program. In other words, we are adjusting the results slightly to account for libraries missing from the data we collected in the Maru/Blue form. We believe that this replicates the weighting scheme applied in 2017-2019.

## **Findings**

#### **Delivering the 2023 TDSRC program**

The programs were primarily offered in English. English-only programs were offered by 985 libraries (or 63%) offered their program in English, French-only programs offered by 276; and bilingual programs offered by 314.

#### **Program promotion**

Those libraries that took part in the Summer Reading Club program this year promoted the program at 16,206 separate events, reaching an estimated 684,765 children in total.

#### Registration

A total of 263,621 children registered for the TDSRC in 2023, an increase of 8% from last year. The program has rebounded most strongly in Atlantic Canada and Quebec. In Ontario and the West, numbers continue to climb year on year but are still short of pre-pandemic registration.

Of those who registered for the program this year, 210,633 children did so in-person and 38,520 registered by way of a 3<sup>rd</sup> party platform working in partnership with the libraries.

Only 5% of registrations occurred by way of the TDSRC website and with no direct contact with the libraries.

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> party platforms

The most popular 3<sup>rd</sup> party platforms used by libraries continue to include:

- Beanstack
- Google Forms
- READsquared
- Facebook

In addition to these platforms, libraries also continue to offer online registration via email or through their own websites.

#### **New Registrations**

Libraries reported nearly two-thirds of the children who registered this year were new to the program. The West recorded the highest proportion of new registrations while Quebec recorded the highest proportion of repeat participants.

#### **Club programs**

In total, 39,060 separate activities were organized across the 1,575 libraries who completed the form, and nearly 685,000 children attended.

The 38,683 club program activities were delivered in the libraries or local communities and only 377 were delivered online. The libraries in Atlantic Canada provided the largest proportion of activities online, but these accounted for approximately 1 in 50 of the activities organized.

#### Website resource use

Just over three-in-five libraries (62%) accessed English-language resources on the website, 27% accessed French-language resources, and 12% accessed both.

Libraires used most of the available website resources with Images the most popular. However, with the exception of Images, usage continues to lag pre-COVID-19 numbers. On a positive note, usage has been steadily trending upward since 2020 across most resources.

Plan for accessibility was recently added as a resource to evaluate. The initial read shows 22% of libraries utilized the resource.




Figure 1: Use of individual website resources over time

Regardless of language, most libraries are accessing the Images. Those accessing resources in

both official languages make use of a wider variety of them, in general.

#### Satisfaction with website resources

When asked to rate each resource on a scale running from 0 "not at all satisfied" to 10 "completely satisfied", satisfaction with the materials is on par with recent years with the exception of Images. A stark decrease in satisfaction from 2022 is observed for Images. Three-in-four libraries were satisfied with Plan for Accessibility.

Those accessing both the French and English resources appear to be more satisfied than those accessing English or French resources alone.



#### Overall satisfaction with website

When asked to rate the website with respect to the ease of navigation, the content, and the look and feel, librarians are less satisfied with each than they have been in the past. Satisfaction is near or at its lowest since monitoring the website first began.


Figure 3: Satisfaction with individual website elements over time



#### Overall satisfaction with the 2023 TD Summer Reading Club

When asked to rate the 2023 TD Summer Reading Club program, nearly 3-in-4 rates the program as 8-10/10, a decline from last year. Libraries in the Atlantic were most satisfied with the program while the other regions were at similar levels of satisfied.

When asked what the TDSRC could have done differently to better support individual libraries in delivering the program, there was mix of complimentary reviews about the overall program and concerns primarily regarding the materials received with a few discussing the website.

Generally speaking, many libraries have positive feedback regarding the programming:

"Love the program! There is nothing that needs to be improved that I can think of."

"You do a wonderful job! We just need more kids in our little community!"

"We are **very satisfied with the website and the content**. The theme always helps with the crafts and games."

"Everything was presented in a timely manner. It was great!"

"Thank you for another fun summer! We **enjoyed the Story Walk** and were happy to share it in the community."

"The TDSRC has done an excellent job in supporting us delivering the program."

However, libraries did raise concerns regarding the theme, resources provided and the website.

#### Theme

"We found the **theme this summer too broad to be able to really plan anything with the theme**. We are much more excited about 2024's theme 'Reach for the Stars'..."

"I found the theme description kind of vague. I would have appreciated a more detailed explanation of what "check this out" was supposed to mean."

#### **Images**

"We were **not big fans of the promotional images** this year. They **didn't really grab your attention**, or work super well as promotional images on posters etc."

"This year's **images weren't cohesive and the colours were difficult to use** with the TDSRC branded colours. This made it difficult to market the program within the brand guidelines. The suggested activities were not appealing to our demo."

#### Activities and Recommended Reads

Many branches in the library system found the booklets and the Recommended Reads lacking. So much of the content is repeated year to year, it's not as new to the children who have done the program before. Families that participate year to year are really looking for something much different each summer, and we have noted that they are not excited or interested in the activity booklets or the corner bookmarks. Our programs for the summer are usually almost completely planned by the time the activities appear on the staff site, so it's hard to incorporate them into our programming. Would be helpful for us to receive the materials earlier to have more time to assemble our kits.

#### Website

The website was difficult to navigate. Parents had to log books for children because they often would not come up in search and it was not simple to figure out how to "add book". It is a reading program the first page should have something like - What did you read today? with a place to enter the book title. They shouldn't have to search for where to enter the book and struggle to add titles to the page. We didn't do many inhouse activities because we are a farming community and people are away over the summer or working. We focused on tracking reading and having participants come in to collect rewards for reading but the website was not a good way of tracking this.

#### Conclusion

Canadian libraries remain very satisfied with the TDRSC program overall as well as the resources provided and program website. They continue to be appreciative of the support received. Libraries increased their efforts to promote the program resulting in an increase of registrations this past summer.

"We appreciate the free resources so much, its an amazing opportunity for families and children!"

"I really appreciate the website for the TDSRC, especially all the French content. Since we are a small library in a minority situation, I will happily use all the help I can find."

"I am happy with the support I received from the TDSRC. The children and parents were very happy with the programs we delivered at the library. I don't have any complaints about this year's program."

With that said, libraries did find areas where the program is lacking. A recurring concern among the libraries is with the content of the resources provided. They feel the activities and incentives need a refresh, especially given increasing registrations among repeat children since COVID-19. The children need new content and incentives to keep them excited about the program. Additionally, the images this past summer were underwhelming. More color was needed to capture the attention of participants.

"We would love to see something entirely new (materials, prizes and the way the club works). -Unfortunately, the Recommended Reads were not popular nor were the fold over bookmarks this year. Kids say they need more to entice them to join and stay in the club (keep returning). -This year's images were not very attractive; many people commented on how the design didn't work well and kids didn't love it. - We used to love it when the themes were more fun/less broad (ie. Going on Safari, LOL, Let's go to the beach, Canada, Travel, etc)."

The website, although helpful, has presented some challenges to a few libraries. The search function appeared to be inefficient as many of the books were not found forcing parents to manually log titles. One suggestion to improve the website experience, that is currently in the works for future years, is to link the children's activity tracked in the TDSRC website so the library in order to track and reward active participants.

"The disconnect between the third party apps that many library's need to use to offer a successful library program - such as Beanstack or Read Squared - and the actual TD Summer Reading website (and the need to create a login for both) is quite confusing for our patrons. However, it is difficult for us as a system to administer the program / local incentives for reading without using a 3rd party software. Is there any way we could have the same sort of access through the national TD Summer Reading Website where people create a login and we can see their activity? I know we have reports of the number that register, but that does not help us monitor progress / administer incentives."

Smaller libraries have different challenges than the larger libraries so certain considerations are needed. Smaller libraries are more likely hire younger staff with less experience to help run the program requiring more guidance. The number of participants for an activity is generally smaller than larger libraires which can result in a larger age disparity in a given group. A more detailed guide on running a successful program and activities that are enticing to a wider age group would be beneficial.

Most small libraries are hiring younger people to run their program. This means they have less experience. It would be nice to have a more detailed 'how to run a successful program'. It would be nice if was more of a training document that covers topics like: working with a group of children successfully, templates of programs like craft clubs or storytimes etc.

Include activities that would work for multiple age groups as oftentimes in our small community, families attend the program together with children of various ages.

#### Registration

The majority of registered children in Quebec were associated with individual libraries and their contribution to the regional total number of registrations increased compared to previous years. #### TDSRC Parent/Caregiver and Kids Survey Results

Online surveys were made available to parents/caregivers and kids through the TDSRC Staff and Kids sites to measure changes in behaviour and attitude, which are key indicators of the program's impact on preventing summer learning loss, improving literacy outcomes and increasing a child's chance for future success in life. We received 3,958 responses from across Canada. As in past years, results were overwhelmingly positive, with most participants maintaining or increasing reading skills and confidence as a result of the program.

#### Here are a few highlights from the survey:

- 95% of parents/caregivers report that their child maintained or increased their confidence as a reader.
- 96% of parents/caregivers say their kids read the same amount or more over the summer.
- 98% of parents/caregivers agree their child has maintained or improved their reading skills over the summer.
- 99% of kids will consider joining the Club again.

#### Here are comments from parents/caregivers:

"All of my kids participated in the program throughout the years. It had a positive impact on their development and interest in reading for pleasure. This helped improve their skills for the school year."

"My son was easily motivated to keep reading. The program allowed us to maintain good reading habits as a family without the fight. This program helped us keep reading positive and fun. Thank you so much for all your time and dedication to the program."

"We have joined for a few years and each summer my daughter is excited to begin. We feel it has helped with literacy and she is a strong reader as a result"

"TD Summer Reading Club is an excellent way to encourage reading to children, and I've been motivated to read since I've been in the club."






Age of Respondents













Number of Respondents 2018-2023











My child is a more confident reader.






My child maintained or improved their reading skills.







My child was able to find books that reflected their identity and experiences.






My child discovered Canadian children's writers and illustrators.
