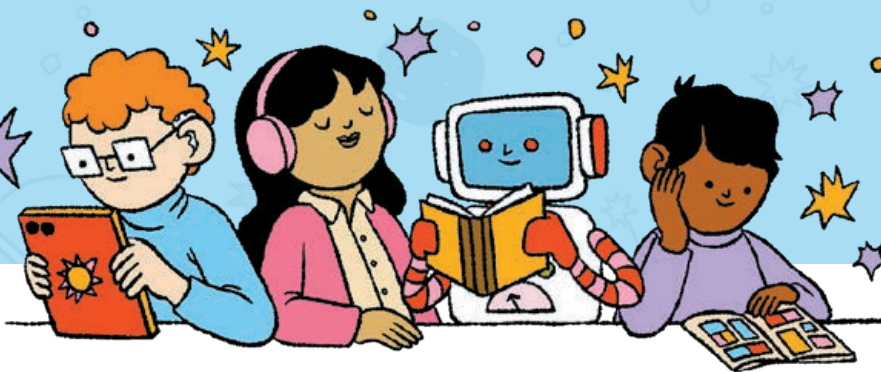

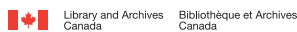

Ways to Raise a Reader



It's never too early to start reading with your little one. **Play, talk, sing, write** and **read** with your child every day to build language skills and help them become a reader.

Search and Find

Can your child find these four images throughout the notebook?



PLAY

Pre-readers learn about the world through play, which helps in understanding stories

**Talk about wishes.
Wish upon a star.**



TALK

Pre-readers learn about language by listening or watching you talk and joining in the conversation

**Count down from 10 to 1.
Take turns blasting off into space in an imaginary rocket ship. Try counting in a different language.**



SING

Singing together increases awareness of the sounds of words

Find your favourite action song and sing along. Create actions to a song that doesn't have them already.



WRITE

Writing helps pre-readers learn that letters and words stand for sounds and that printed text has meaning

Encourage your child to scribble or draw a picture. Print their name at the bottom, then let them try.



READ

Shared reading is the most effective way to help children become good readers



Connect with real-life objects from a story. For example, show actual fruits alongside *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* by Eric Carle.

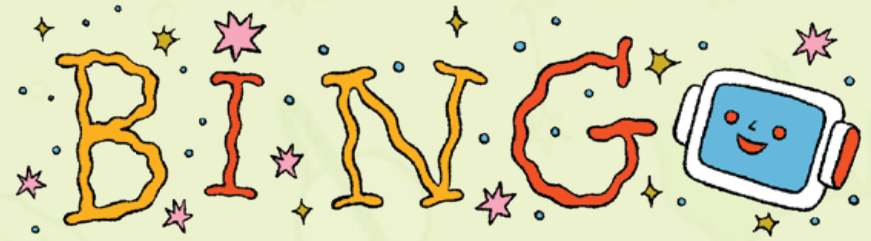

Make instruments from things around the kitchen. Play them

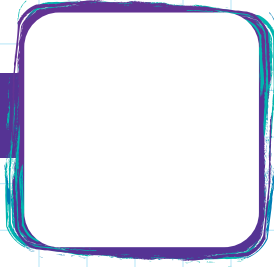

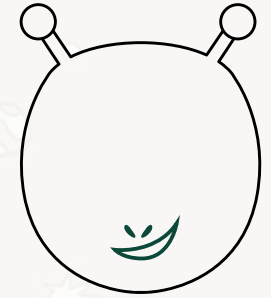


Read Anywhere, Read Often

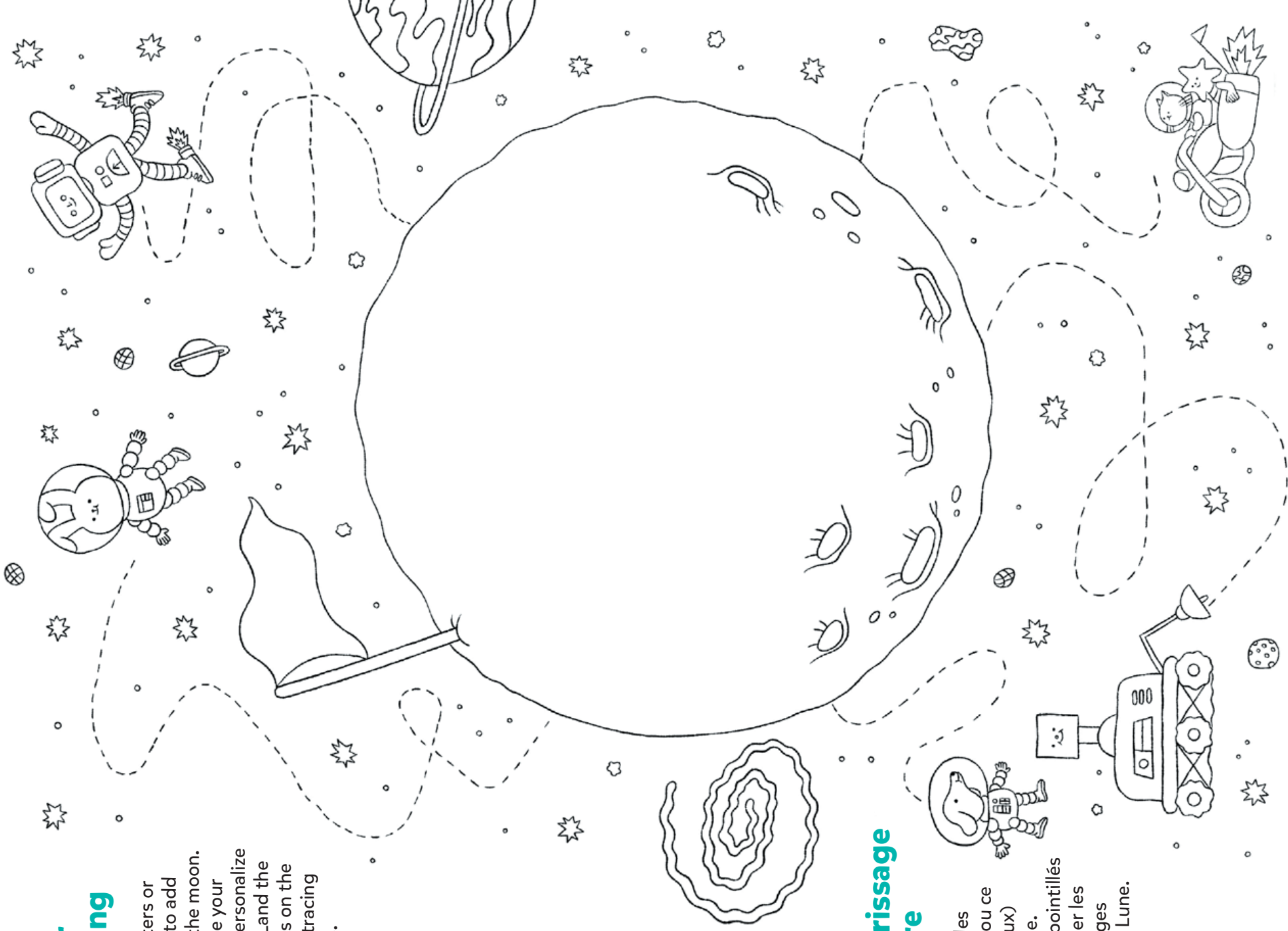
